Birkhead, Nate, and **Jordan M. Ragusa**. "From Enactment to Repeal: Examining the Post-Passage Fate of Landmark Laws." (Book Project)

★ Our understanding of Congress is shaped by the laws it enacts. Yet lawmakers often perform the opposite action: repealing major laws. Despite this, no book has conducted an in-depth examination of repeals. Using an original database of all major repeals from 1877 to 2012, we seek to fill this gap by examining when and why repeals happen. One of our core arguments is that when Congress repeals laws, it often does so when parties are unified in opposition to one another, usually after the minority at passage re-gains power after a long period in the minority. In this respect, we believe repeals are best understood as long term contests between "two great teams" over the nation's laws. As the Affordable Care Act (ACA) illustrates, when the majority enacts a major law, the struggle continues long after the bill is signed.
